God's Dream House

What if you have a passion for hospitality—you just love to gather together with friends around good food, drink, and conversation. Your day job is as a book editor for a major publishing house with an emphasis on mapping out what the reading public is looking for in their next great read. In order to stay with your publisher, you have to be in the office 3 days a week and work remotely the rest of time, but that does mean you have to relocate closer to say, Indianapolis.

So you're house hunting. You find what you think might be the perfect home. It's a home built back in a time when entertaining meant a big kitchen and a spacious dining room. Your prospective home has both as well as just the right kind of character, rich woodwork, hardwood floors, and a number of quirky architectural touches that are right up your alley. You can't help yourself. You make an offer, it's accepted and the next thing you know you're moving in.

The previous owners obviously loved to entertain as well, but as they got older, they got less and less interested in keeping things up. As you invite a variety of neighbors and folks from church to your first book club meeting (which is your crafty way of doing market research), you discover that the air conditioner has seen better days. It's a hot evening and with the thermostat turned down as low as it will go, you're only able to keep it a few degrees cooler than outside.

The beautiful vintage gas range includes an oven that has zero sense of temperature. You set your cake in it to bake and the next thing you know the smoke detector is going off because it's magically shifted to broil. And your dishwasher only works when you wash the dishes BEFORE you put them in. Yes, it is an older home, but the built-in sconces which were so charming to the eye, flicker on and off throughout the evening.

The book club and planned tasty dessert end up being a fiasco. You spend all your time making adjustments that you never hear what they are saying about the author you're thinking of signing to your publisher. Worse still, your food is so bad that you end up serving store bought cookies with your coffee and tea.

Your house is still your dream home, it's just going to require a second mortgage to rewire the electricity, replace the appliances, plug the small but persistent leak in the roof, and update the heating and cooling. You just wish things had been addressed when they came up. Until you get the underlying structural problems reigned in, you really can't pursue your passion or use your home to carry out your job.

Hopefully, by now you've heard something about this spring/summer's Capital Campaign, Renovate and Elevate. The motivation for the campaign is to get caught up in repairing, replacing, and upgrading the systems that make up our building and grounds. It is just too hard to take care of the routine maintenance as well as salaries, programs, worship, and other ministries out of our yearly operating budget. We have ended up delaying maintenance on a number of our core structural and mechanical needs and now we've gotten to the point at which we cannot put them off any longer.

Just like in the illustration I shared above, our inability to heat and cool, to keep dry, to keep safe, and to repair what is no longer working efficiently or at all is getting in the way of our passion and our purpose. We need to get back to doing the Lord's work in ministry and to do that we need to raise \$1.6 million dollars over the next three years to get us back where we need to be. If we can do that, then we will be able to focus more fully on our passion for God and our purpose of making disciples for Jesus Christ. And we can do it without having those resources siphoned away for building issues.

I am encouraging the entire congregation to ask, "Lord, how do you want to use me in this?" Sue and I have been praying that prayer for several months already to try and discern what kind of sacrificial gift we can offer. We're doing that because this is vital. We're doing this because what we have done and are doing is life changing. On top of that, we appreciate those who've come before us who have made sacrifices of their own to help fulfill God's purpose in this place—through this church.

You'll be hearing a lot more about this in the coming weeks. Please listen and consider what is being said and what is being asked. I believe we can meet our goal and



surpass it. I believe we have everything we need at Carmel United Methodist Church to honor God and serve others and to make our Lord and Savior proud.

Works in Progress: 2025 Building Projects

In the March and April Contact newsletters, your Trustees and Facilities Staff summarized the \$830,000 in major building projects completed over the past four years and the funding sources used. That brings us to the ongoing projects for the current year, 2025.

Preschool and Sunday School projects

With the Preschoolers away for Spring Break, it was a good opportunity to complete some projects planned for our building's North Wing.

Highly efficient air conditioning and heat pump mini-splits were installed and relocated for classrooms 115 and 117 and the Preschool office, Room 109. This completes the replacement of failing, inefficient heating and cooling units in 11 individual rooms, which began in 2023. Along with classroom 107, which was replaced over the long MLK Holiday weekend, the installations and masonry repair totaled \$59,900 funded from our church operating reserves.

Flooring in rooms 106, 107 and 117 were also replaced using \$11,680 in Preschool funds with staff performing spot painting and removal of the old loft in room 117.

To further increase visibility and security during the week, a remotely operated video intercom lock was installed on the main Preschool entrance at session Door 6, near the playground. It is the same system used for doors 3 and 4 leading into the Gathering Place and Family Life Center hallway. The installation cost of \$4,207 was also paid with Preschool & Maintenance Endowment funds.

In addition to typical summer maintenance of power-washing, spot painting, mulching, weeding and carpet cleaning, we're working with the CUMC Preschool to improve the Rec Room in the North Wing basement, which is used for inclement weather recess. Stay tuned for updates in future issues of The Contact!



New South Wing Roof

Replacement of the flat and shingled 1980 South Wing roof, along with the Gathering Place skylights, has been scheduled in early summer to minimize impacts to Preschool Graduation on May 12 and Vacation Bible School on June 8-11.

Look for part of the Gathering Place to be blocked off near the Sanctuary doors starting May 13 to install the new skylight. During this time, plan to enter the Sanctuary from the Narthex at the back.

Depending on weather and contractor/ material availability, you should expect to see equipment from mid- through late May and workers on site during the week. Please pardon any dust or debris, and thanks in advance for your patience as we improve and safeguard our beautiful church!

The estimated cost for this project is \$101,682, which is also funded with operating reserves. This year, large building projects are being funded through operating reserves, which will be replenished with Capital Campaign funds.

Heating and Cooling Long-Term Plan

Our church successfully applied for and was awarded a nearly \$25,000 matching grant from the Lilly Foundation's Center for Congregations. It is being used to fund an engineer's holistic review of our building and its 22 heating and cooling systems.

Advanced Engineering Consultants expects to complete Phase 1 of its review in June, which will help guide the implementation of our Capital Campaign projects.


Renovating Our Spaces, Elevating Our Future



May is "Family Promise" Month

Homelessness can happen to anyone. It can be the result of the loss of a job, divorce, mental illness, addiction, large medical bills, an uninhabitable apartment or a variety of other reasons. It is more prevalent in Indianapolis because Indiana law favors landlords more than any other state. Because of these laws, Indianapolis has one of the highest number of evictions in the country. This is tragic because once a landlord brings an eviction proceeding against a person, that person will have an extremely difficult time finding a landlord who will lease him an apartment.

Family Promise's goal is to assist homeless families in a way that will solve the immediate problem of homelessness and provide a path to self-sufficiency. The apartment shelter initiative is the primary program to accomplish that objective.

Currently, Family Promise has 20 apartments which it makes available to families for a period of 30-90 days. During that period, families receive a number of services including job counseling, budgeting, help with child care and school enrollment, arrangements for health care including physicals, immunizations, and mental health services. In many cases, if the



parents have stable income, they can take over the lease of that apartment after the trial period. Then the family is permitted to keep the furnishings in that apartment.

In other cases, the family moves to another location, usually because the parents want to be closer to a job or family. If a family chooses to stay in that Family Promise apartment, then the organization will lease another apartment and place a new family in that apartment.

CUMC supports Family Promise in four ways. First, once a year CUMC solicits household items (other than furniture) to furnish an apartment. Then CUMC volunteers set up an apartment using the donated items. Second, CUMC volunteers prepare and deliver a meal to a family once a week and this year November will be our meal delivery month. Typically,

the volunteers who prepare the meal are not the same as the volunteers who deliver the meal. This program enables CUMC volunteers to have interaction with the family that we are helping. Third, during VBS, we collect gently used children's books to be distributed to Family Promise children. Finally, CUMC provides financial support to Family Promise from its Missions Fund.

One thing that motivates CUMC volunteers is that Family Promise has a phenomenal success rate: over 80% of families who complete the Family Promise program continue to be independent during the subsequent two years. This is truly life changing for a family that once was homeless.

In May, 2024, CUMC collected over 110 household items from 42 members to furnish a two-bedroom apartment. We filled every shelf in the Missions Closet! In addition, two CUMC families donated furniture to Mustard Seed, to be placed in future apartments. In July, 2024, ten CUMC volunteers loaded the Family Promise van as well as two cars to deliver goods to the apartment. Ron and Jeannine Williams joined the Bennetts to unload the vehicles and set up the apartment. An unhoused family moved into the apartment at the end of July.

We are looking forward to the CUMC apartment furnishings drive this May. A needy family is awaiting our donations!



Urgent Need Met to Replace the Fire Sprinkler Shut Off Valve!

One of the church's sprinkler system shut offs (over 30 years old) was frozen and could not be freed up by any means. Signs of corrosion were also a contributing factor. Since the shut off failed the Spring fire safety inspection it was critical to repair or replace this shut off valve immediately. After some negotiation the Trustees were able to get a quote of \$3,108 to repair/replace the valve. (See pictures.)
